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

lhe British cabinet war rooms are swarming with activity as London's air raid sirens blare overhead. Men and women move model planes across a map of Britain as radio reports flood in. Prime Minister Winston Churchill enters and orders the use of their "secret

weapon". A new model is added to the map, but it is not a plane: it is a Dalek...

A month later, the TARDIS arrives. The Doctor and Amy are greeted by Churchill and some soldiers. The Doctor has come at Churchill's request, but he is late. They are informed that a squadron of German Stukas are approaching London. They ascend to the roof. "We stand at a crossroads. Doctor." Churchill savs. "Quite alone. With our backs to the wall. Invasion is expected daily. So, I will grasp with both hands anything that will give

us an advantage over the Nazi menace." Amy is stunned to see London in the early 1940s, filled with barrage balloons. They are introduced to Professor Edwin Bracewell and watch as the Stukas are all shot out of the sky by an energy weapon. The Doctor is unnerved. "That sounded like..." He races to Bracewell and yells, "Show me what that was!"

Bracewell proudly introduces his "Ironside", but the Doctor recognises it as a Dalek. It is painted green and has a Union Flag on its dome. "I am your



soldier," it says to the Doctor. The Dalek claims not to know him. "What is your ultimate aim?" Bracewell asks it. "To win the war," the Dalek responds.

The Doctor is unable to convince Churchill to destroy the Daleks. Churchill insists that Bracewell invented them. "Millions of innocent lives will be saved if I use these Ironsides now!" he argues.

The Doctor goes to Bracewell's laboratory. He tells the Doctor that ideas seem to just come to him; he shows him his notes on hypersonic flight and



gravity bubbles. Churchill joins them as a Dalek offers the Doctor some tea. The Doctor knocks the cup away and yells in anger, "Stop this! What are you doing here? What do you want?!" The Dalek continues to play the part of an innocent servant. The Doctor attacks it with a large iron spanner. "You are everything I despise... I am the Doctor, and you are the Daleks!" The Doctor kicks the Dalek. and it finally responds with honesty: "Correct." It turns to its comrade: "Review testimony." The Doctor's words are played back. The Dalek transmits the testimony to a Dalek saucer ship hiding behind the Moon. A small device activates inside the craft.

The Daleks blast Bracewell's hand off at the wrist, revealing him to be an android. They transmat out of the laboratory and arrive aboard their saucer ship. "The Progenitor is activated. It begins," a third Dalek states, its metallic voice echoing coldly.

The Doctor runs to the TARDIS but stops Amy from joining him. He departs.

The Daleks observe the Progenitor in operation and wait for the results. The TARDIS materialises. The Daleks move to kill the Doctor, but he holds them off with a jammy dodger, claiming that it is a self-destruct unit for the TARDIS. "One move and I'll destroy us all, you got that?" he says. The Daleks hold their fire. They explain that they found the last Progenitor device in the universe: a sealed container of pure Dalek DNA. The Doctor deduces that the device rejected the Daleks as 'impure', so they needed the Doctor's testimony to activate it.



The Daleks activate a device that floods London with energy. Every light in the city switches on, leaving it an easy target for the German bombers. Churchill is informed that the enemy bombers are only ten minutes away.

The Daleks demand that the Doctor leave their ship. The Doctor refuses. "I won't let you get away this time!" The Progenitor finishes its work. Five new Daleks emerge from a machine – they are larger than the Ironside Daleks and individually coloured. "Behold the restoration of the Daleks!" one of the Ironside Daleks shouts.

Amy and Churchill find Bracewell holding his revolver, preparing to kill himself. They convince him to help them fight the



DALEKS AT WAR

The initial premise for the story came from *Doctor Who* showrunner Steve Moffat: "I took [writer Mark Gatiss] out for a drink and said, 'I want you to do the Daleks meet Churchill.' I knew that he would write Churchill really well. I knew he'd do his research properly because Mark always does, and I knew he'd get the feel of the wartime characters brilliantly." Moffat felt that the Daleks would suit the World War II setting: "It's like British icons shoved together. Churchill is a British icon; the Union Jack is a British icon. Everything about the war is somehow [iconic]; [it's] our noblest hour, surviving that Blitz. Bizarrely, the Daleks feel as though they're part of it. In their design, they just look so right. When we slapped those Union Jacks on them, it's scary how right that looks. I'd been to the underground bunker before we started work on that episode, and I couldn't get it out of my head how a Dalek would look so appropriate motoring around those desks and maps."



lan McNeice played Winston Churchill: "I tried to get the essence of the man. He was such an incredible, iconic character. His humour, his wit, his bluster, his courage, his compassion - all of those things, you've got to put into it, really. You've got to try to give an overall feeling of Churchill. There's so much news footage and all his speeches as well, and he has a special way of speaking too. It's a huge challenge to try and pull all that off." Churchill's distinct voice has been imitated many times: "The voice is based basically on a lot of the speeches that you can still hear. The cadences go up and down. It's very sort of earnest, very ponderous, very, very, very Churchill."

The New Dalek Paradigm declares the three Ironside Daleks to be inferior and promptly destroys them. "Blimey. What do you do to the ones who mess up?" the Doctor asks. The white Dalek approaches the Doctor, who holds out the disc again. "Don't mess with me, sweetheart," he says.

Bracewell has assembled a video monitor which can pick up Dalek transmissions. Amy and Churchill watch as the Doctor confronts the new Daleks. They each have titles: "Scientist", "Strategist", "Eternal", "Drone", and "Supreme". Churchill orders their new force into combat. An officer transmits a message:



"Broadsword to Danny Boy! Scramble! Scramble! Scramble!"

The Doctor's bluff is exposed by the Strategist Dalek: "Scan reveals nothing! TARDIS self-destruct device non-existent!" The Doctor eats the 'disc'. "Alright, it's a Jammy Dodger, but I was promised tea!" he says. The Daleks are suddenly alerted to three objects approaching in space. The Doctor is delighted when he realises that they are Spitfires protected by gravity bubbles. He tells them to attack the dish on the Dalek ship and then races back inside the TARDIS before the Daleks can kill him.

Two of the Spitfires are shot down. The Doctor disrupts the Dalek shields. and the third, call-signed Danny Boy, succeeds in blowing up the dish. London plunges back into darkness. Danny Boy circles around and prepares to destroy the Dalek ship. The Supreme contacts the Doctor inside the TARDIS and tells him that Bracewell is powered by an Oblivion Continuum. If the Spitfire is not called off, the Daleks will detonate it and destroy Earth. They begin the countdown. The Doctor is forced to order Danny Boy to withdraw.

The Doctor returns to Earth. He races into the war room and punches Bracewell. The blow exposes the truth: a mechanical body with a countdown clock in Bracewell's chest. The Doctor tries to get Bracewell to concentrate on his memories to stop the countdown but fails. Amy asks Bracewell about his romantic life. The memories of a young woman named Dorabella calm Bracewell.



Emotion steadies him and releases his body from Dalek control. Earth is saved.

The New Dalek Paradigm escapes into the future. The Doctor is furious. He knows that they will rebuild the Dalek Empire yet again. "I had a choice... they knew I'd choose the Earth," he says.

The Doctor makes sure all of the Dalek technology is dismantled. He and Amy say goodbye to Churchill and go to see Bracewell. He expects them to deactivate him, but they suggest he goes off to find Dorabella instead. He gleefully agrees.

commented, "My ambition with this episode, really, was to do a sort of 45-minute Bank Holiday war movie." Group Captain Childers' use of the call signs "Broadsword" and "Danny Boy" is a direct nod to the 1968 war film Where Eagles Dare, starring Richard Burton and Clint Eastwood. where the same codenames are famously used.

he Daleks had undergone a dramatic resurrection thanks to their creator, Davros. Taking pieces of his own body, he had used his genetic material as a template to engineer a new Dalek race - but this had proved to be a fatal vulnerability. A duplicate of the Doctor had used the genetic uniformity of the Daleks against them, simultaneously destroying millions of them on a biological level. The Dalek fleet was wiped out. However, one Dalek ship managed to escape, travelling backwards in time. It was badly damaged, and most of its crew were dead. Only three Daleks survived. They were the last hope of the Dalek race.

A plan was formulated. Thousands of Dalek Progenitor devices had been created and placed in strategic positions across the universe: buried inside drifting asteroids; stored deep within ancient catacombs; concealed in the depths of impenetrable alien jungles. The Progenitors were sophisticated genetic banks containing the pure DNA of Daleks that had originated on Skaro.



With a single Progenitor, the Daleks could rebuild their species. However, the Time War had taken its toll on the Daleks' resources; Gallifreyan hunter squads had apparently tracked down and destroyed every last Progenitor in existence. Over a century passed as the Daleks searched the cosmos.

At last, secreted deep within a cavern on Jupiter's largest moon Ganymede, they discovered a single intact Progenitor [1]. But the Daleks' celebration was short-lived. The Progenitor was an intelligent device, programmed to only obey Dalek commands. It refused to acknowledge their status as true Daleks; they were the product of Davros' genetic origins, and therefore judged impure by the Progenitor's standards.



The Progenitor's proximity to Earth led the Daleks to an alternate solution. They were aware that the planet was frequently visited by their oldest enemy, the Doctor. The planet's native species, humans, were often defended by the Time Lord, and were considered valuable to him. The Progenitor had been programmed with all known Dalek information on the Doctor, and would recognise him instantly. With careful planning, the Daleks realised that the Doctor's status could be turned to their advantage.

The Daleks scanned Earth, searching for the Doctor. They failed to locate

him or his TARDIS, but they detected slight traces of Artron radiation (an energy sometimes generated by a TARDIS) lingering on one human: Winston Churchill [2], a political leader. A concentrated time/space visualiser probe revealed that Churchill had encountered the Doctor on several occasions in his personal timeline, and had gained the trust of their most hated enemy. He would be their means to lure the Doctor to them.

The major powers of Earth were at war in this era, and war was something the Daleks understood completely. Gaining the trust of Churchill would be a simple task if they could present themselves as useful weapons. The Daleks required



an unwitting servant for their plan. They chose Professor Edwin Bracewell [3] of the University of Glasgow. Bracewell lived alone and would not be missed. They transmatted him to their ship and made a detailed physiological recording of his body and a psionic probe of his memories. A robotic duplicate of Bracewell was created, and the original was incinerated in the ship's reactor core. The Bracewell duplicate had no understanding of its true nature, and believed itself to be human.

Two of the Daleks placed themselves in Bracewell's workshop and took on the role of robotic servants [4]. The Bracewell robot was programmed with enough scientific knowledge to be able to describe their functions with confidence. Believing that it had spent years working on its 'Ironsides', the Bracewell robot contacted the War Office and offered a demonstration. The Daleks were soon transported to meet Winston Churchill himself.

The mentality of a Dalek does not easily lend itself to subterfuge. Programmed into their core essence is the unwavering



belief that they are superior to all other life in the universe and that they should either dominate or destroy any alien life they encounter. But this was as desperate a situation as they had ever found themselves in – their race was teetering on the precipice of extinction. The Daleks interacted with humans, obeying their orders, offering them refreshments and acting as completely subservient robots.


The Daleks' scheme worked when the Doctor finally arrived, summoned by Churchill. The Doctor's unwitting testimony, that they were indeed Daleks, unlocked the Progenitor. With the creation of the New Dalek Paradigm, the older Daleks had no further function. They accepted their execution from their successors. While the Ironside Daleks did not survive, they lived long enough to see the successful fulfilment of their plan.

The Daleks' covert identity as the 'Ironsides' required some superficial alteration to their appearance. They were painted khaki green to match the colour of vehicles in the British armed forces. They were equipped with canteens of water, first-aid kits, food and ammunition, all as part of their pretence of providing support for human soldiers. A Union Flag was added below their eyestalk. Their dome lights were covered when outside to comply with the laws on the nightly London blackout.




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
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
PANEL FOR BASE SELF-ADHESIVE STICKERS (X 6)



#62-01

Take the stickers 62B and when needed, remove the yellow protective backing.





#62-03

Similarly, one at a time remove the backing from the remaining three stickers 62B and fix them in place on the other half of the base assembly, as indicated here.



#62-04

Check that all the nuts and bolts holding the base together are fully tightened. Position the panel 62A on the base assembly, ensuring that all the circular cutouts match the features on the base assembly and all screw holes are aligned. There are also pairs of small holes around the edge of part 62A, which fit over small

pegs on the pedestal adaptors, circled in the two insets. The glossy side of the panel faces the base assembly.
