Jamie helps Kemel reach the balcony safely. He then tries the door to Victoria's room. "Miss Waterfield," he calls, "can you open the door? We've come to get you!" Another Dalek appears on the floor below them, attracting Jamie and Kemel's attention. A second Dalek glides out of the shadows behind them, but Jamie spots

it. He and Kemel each take an end of their climbing rope and use it to force the Dalek over the edge of the balcony. It falls to the floor below and explodes.

Jamie and Kemel race into Victoria's room and bolt the door behind them. Victoria is relieved to see Kemel. They quickly move Victoria's bed and two chests against the door to barricade it. "Well now, they can't get in and we can't get out, so where does that put us?" Jamie wonders. He turns to Victoria and introduces himself. Jamie hands her the handkerchief with her initials. "I came to give you this," he says. Victoria smiles.

The Doctor offers Arthur Terrall a drink in another room of the large house. Terrall refuses. "Ever since I came to

this house, I have never seen you eat or drink anything," the Doctor comments. "Waterfield has never seen you eat or drink either." Terrall takes a sword from a wall mounting and approaches the Doctor. "It isn't wise to make assumptions," he says. The Doctor pulls out a screwdriver and touches the sword with it. The screwdriver sticks to the sword magnetically. Terrall drops the sword to the floor. The Doctor points out that the sword lost its magnetism as soon as Terrall let go of it. "Now, if I didn't know better, Mr Terrall, I'd say you were full of some sort of electricity," the Doctor remarks, smiling.

Waterfield appears and asks the Doctor to come with him. As he starts to walk away, Terrall says, "No doubt you're a



someone commanding her to walk to her cell. Jamie is sure that someone in the house wants the Daleks to succeed, and that this person has the ability to control people's minds.

Maxtible hypnotises Mollie. Terrall watches as Maxtible tells her that there are no mysteries in the house and that her hearing Victoria's voice was only a dream. Mollie obediently walks back to her room. Maxtible tells Terrall that the experiment is progressing and that "Waterfield's usefulness is nearing its end".

Terrall suddenly clutches his head again, this time in fear. The confused man asks for Maxtible's help. "I can only help you if you obey me," Maxtible says. A hidden door slides open, revealing the south wing of the house. "You will fetch Victoria Waterfield and bring her to me," Maxtible commands. Once again, Terrall hears the Dalek voice inside his mind. He obeys, as if in a trance.

Waterfield meets the Doctor in the laboratory. The Doctor is preparing a small capsule filled with machinery. "Jamie was magnificent," the Doctor says, "but then I knew he would be. He produced a whole battery of emotions, each one of which is imprinted in here, see?" Waterfield stares at the capsule. "The Human Factor?" he asks. "Well, a part of it at least," the Doctor replies. "The better part: courage, pity, chivalry, friendship, even compassion." The Doctor walks over to the three dormant Daleks: "It's a positronic brain. We're going to implant one of these into each of these three Daleks here." Waterfield



wonders if the Human Factor will turn them into super-beings: The Doctor looks troubled. "I can't help feeling that there's more in this than meets the eye."

A Dalek exits the Time Cabinet and tells the Doctor to speak when he has finished preparing the capsules. Once it departs, Waterfield asks the Doctor to stop the experiment – they'll be destroying the future of humanity, he argues. The Doctor tells him that the time to stop was long ago. Waterfield picks up an iron bar, but the Doctor takes it off him. "Attacking me will do no good," the Doctor says. He urges Waterfield to help him save Jamie and Victoria.

Kemel notices that the door is growing hotter. While he and Jamie stack up



been student of human nature, but some things are better left alone." The Doctor turns and stares at him. "No, Mr Terrall, I am not a student of human nature. I am a professor of a far wider academy, of which human nature is merely a part."

Now on his own, Terrall lifts a cup to his lips. He hears a Dalek voice in his mind telling him to "Obey!" He throws the cup down and clutches his head in pain.

Jamie asks Victoria how the Daleks captured her. She has a dim memory of

A model Dalek was filmed at Ealing for the scene in which the Dalek guarding Victoria is smashed through the balcony railing at the beginning of the episode. Some special props were required,

including small magnetised objects that could be picked up by Arthur Terrall's sword, suggesting to the Doctor that he was charged with static electricity. Peter Hawkins pre-recorded a Dalek voice shouting "Obey!", which was played live in studio whenever Terrall had a mental attack.

DEBORAH WATLING



This episode featured the first meeting between Jamie and Victoria. Deborah Watling recalled her first day working on *Doctor Who* in a 2001 interview: "We filmed at a big house in Harrow, owned, I think, by Gilbert and Sullivan! I wore a long Victorian frock and posed for some pictures by a pond in the gardens. I remember meeting Frazer [Hines], and my co-stars on the very first day were the Daleks. I was slightly nervous, but the Daleks broke the ice! The guys inside would, er... well,



some crates against it, they fail to notice Arthur Terrall appearing from behind a hidden sliding door in the wall. He clamps a hand over Victoria's mouth and pulls her through the doorway, which slides shut. Victoria bites Terrall's hand and cries out to Jamie. Kemel finds a hidden switch and the door slides open again. He and Jamie run down a corridor that divides in two. They decide to split up in their search for Victoria.

Terrall takes a sword and waits by the half-open door for Jamie. He swings at Jamie but misses. Jamie grabs another sword and they fight. A shocked Ruth and Mollie come across the battle. Ruth tells Mollie to fetch the Doctor. Ruth begs Terrall to stop fighting. Terrall ignores her but suddenly falls to the ground.



The Doctor appears and tells Ruth and Mollie to head for the stables and prepare to get as far away from the house as possible. The Doctor removes a control device from beneath Terrall's shirt. The man awakens, deeply confused. Terrall is concerned for Victoria's safety, but the Doctor assures him she is well. Terrall staggers off to find Ruth.

Kemel enters the laboratory, where he finds Victoria unconscious on the floor. A Dalek appears behind him. It orders Kemel to pick Victoria up and go into the Time Cabinet.

The Doctor and Jamie enter the laboratory later. The Doctor comments that his work has gone well, but this remark reignites Jamie's anger. He believes that the Doctor has treated their entire situation as a game. "People have died!" Jamie yells. "The Daleks are all over the place, fit to murder the lot of us, and all you can say is that you've had a good night's work!" The Doctor tries to placate his friend, but Jamie refuses to listen: "You and me, we're finished! You're just too callous for me!" The Doctor tries to make Jamie believe that he cares, but Jamie feels betrayed by the Doctor secretly testing him.

The three dormant Daleks begin to stir. Jamie runs over to them, alarmed. "It's all right, Jamie, they're friends," the Doctor says. The side of their container opens, and the Daleks slowly exit. Mxtible enters the laboratory, excited. He explains to Jamie that Jamie's thoughts and emotions have been placed inside the Daleks' minds: "The Human Factor to



add to their own powers, to triumph over human beings!"

The three Daleks circle around the Doctor, trapping him. "What is it?" the Doctor asks. "What do you want?" The Dalek behind the Doctor moves forward, picking him up and pushing him around the laboratory. "Jamie, they're taking me for a ride!" the Doctor exclaims, delighted. "They're playing a game!" The Doctor starts to laugh out loud as the Dalek continues to whisk him around the room. Jamie watches, unsure...

you can just imagine what they did with their plungers! 'Ouch!' You couldn't hear them creeping up behind you, so they would, well... it hurt!" Watling was unsure why the Daleks became so popular: "I can't fathom this one! Everyone knows a Dalek, don't they? I'm not being detrimental, but they were just little men inside tin cans with, sort of, plungers and bubbles, and we had to convince the audience that they were really, really frightening! It was just extraordinary." She had fond memories of Hines: "He was very jokey! He was nice: we got on terribly well. He has a great sense of humour. We would shriek with laughter, driving some poor directors up the wall! And Pat [Troughton] used to join in."



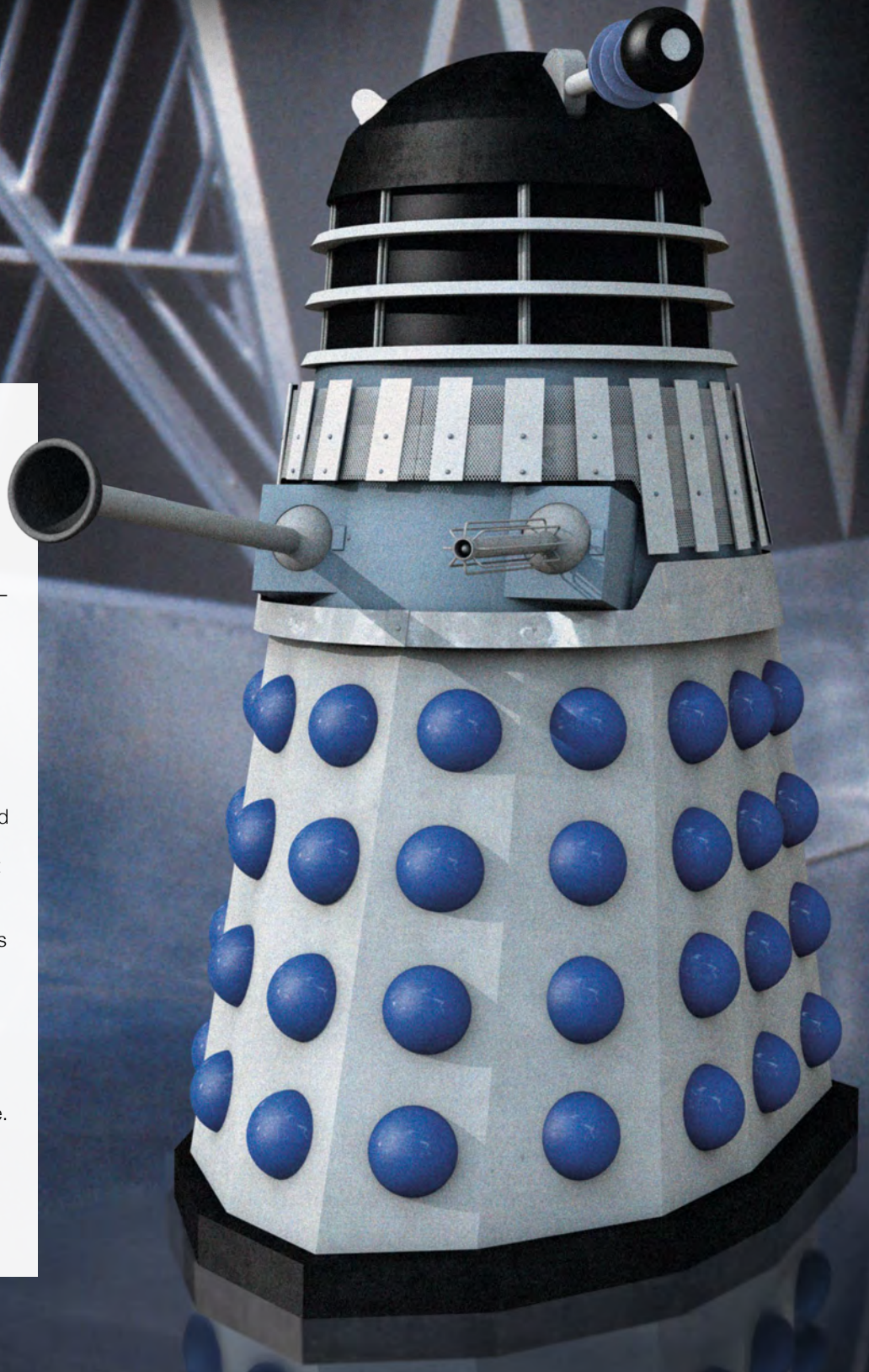
The Evil of the Daleks would be the only Dalek story to feature Jamie. "When they said it was the Daleks next, I was really looking forward to it. I wanted to ride in one and sit in one and fool around in one, and I did!" *The Evil of the Daleks* was one of Hines' favourite adventures: "I thought it was a lovely story, especially when Marius Goring changed the brain of the Daleks and they became friendly and played trains with Patrick."

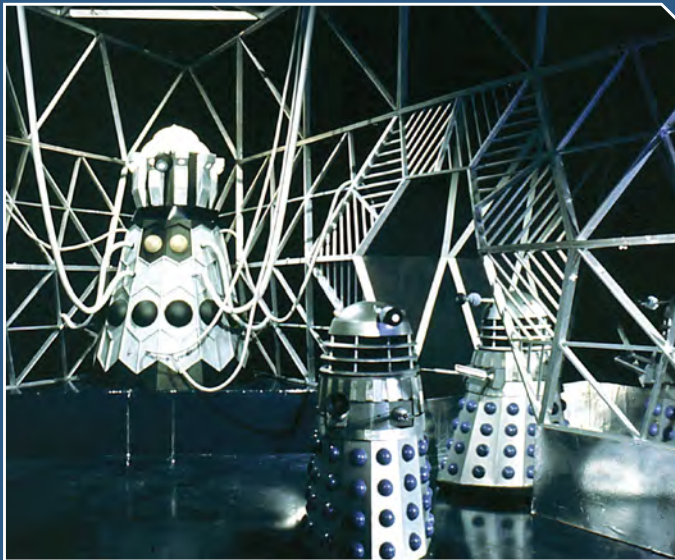
BLACK DALEK LEADER

For a period of Dalek history, the Black Daleks were elite commanders, second only to the Dalek Emperor in the hierarchy of Skaro.

The Black Dalek Leaders reported only to the Emperor and were in charge of most of the functions of the Dalek City. The Black Daleks were also responsible for discipline within the Dalek ranks. If a Dalek made a mistake or failed in any way, it was a Black Dalek's duty – and also its honour – to exterminate it, with all other Daleks observing.

When Theodore Maxtible angrily challenged a Black Dalek over the destruction of his house, he asked it: "What right did you have to destroy it?!" The Black Dalek repeated the word "right" over and over. It analysed the strange word, uncertain of its meaning, as Daleks have no concept of innate rights of any form. It did, however, understand defiance – it had seen such behaviour many times during the rise of the Dalek Empire, from lesser species on other worlds. They had often dared to challenge Dalek authority. The Black Dalek struck Maxtible, knocking him to the ground. Maxtible's manner suddenly changed to one of fearful compliance. The Black Dalek was satisfied for the time being. It would have preferred to simply exterminate the insolent creature, but the Emperor still had a use for the human.





Another Black Dalek soon encountered Omega, one of the three Daleks that the Doctor had altered with the Human Factor. Omega had a unique marking on its casing that distinguished it from other Daleks: such expressions of individuality were strictly forbidden in Dalek society. The Black Dalek was angered by Omega's assertion that it had a name and that the Doctor was its friend. "Friend" was another word that the Black Dalek only vaguely understood.

Omega was happy to reveal everything it knew about the Doctor, and the Black Dalek took this information and used it in a cunning fashion. The Black Dalek had a more advanced mind than a standard Dalek, and understood the tactical advantage of deceit. It sent another Dalek posing as Omega to meet the Doctor. The Black Dalek's agent attempted to lead the Doctor into a trap, but the Doctor was not taken in by the fake marking on the Dalek's casing and pushed it into a chasm.

Even so, the Black Dalek correctly predicted the route the Doctor would take to gain entrance to the Dalek City and captured him and his two companions. The Black Dalek's next task was to oversee the completion of the machine that would implant the Dalek Factor in the Doctor's mind. Once the work was finished, the Black Dalek commanded all Daleks in the area to stop working.

Somewhere in the crowd of Daleks, a single voice could be heard in reply, speaking a single word: "Why?"

This word sent the Black Dalek into a barely controlled rage. "Who spoke?" it demanded. "Who questioned a Dalek command?!" Never before on Skaro had a Dalek ever challenged a superior in even the slightest way. The word "why" in this context was virtually unthinkable. The Black Dalek knew that the ability to

question could destroy Dalek civilisation completely, but the marking had been removed and there was no way to tell which Dalek had spoken.

The Dalek Factor experiment continued. An archway was prepared with neural emitters that generated a psionic force field. It could reprogram any human mind, instilling it with the Dalek ideology of total obedience and a desire to kill. The Black Dalek lured Maxtible through it, and he was instantly transformed into the Daleks' puppet. A few hours later, the Doctor was also tricked into passing through the archway and seemed to be similarly changed. Everything appeared to be going to plan.

The presence of Daleks on Skaro with the Human Factor was still concerning to both the Black Dalek and the Emperor. A search for the altered Daleks met with no success. The Emperor knew that a group of Daleks with individual personalities and the ability to question would spread like an infection through the Dalek population. When the transformed Doctor suggested that they use the archway with the Dalek Factor to reprogramme every Dalek, the Emperor quickly agreed.

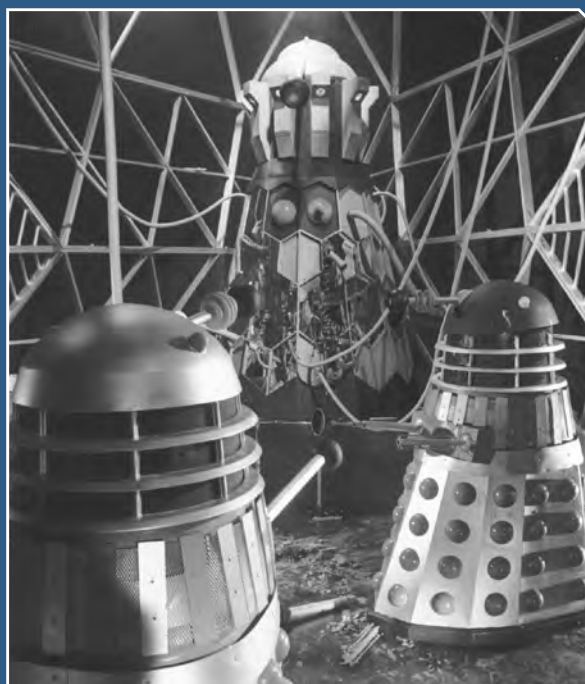
This was a fatal mistake: the Doctor had not been

affected by the Dalek Factor at all. In addition, he had now swapped the Dalek Factor for the Human Factor. As the Dalek population began to pass through the archway, they all gained a sense of self-determination.

The Black Daleks were soon faced with a group of Daleks that ignored their commands and spoke in playful tones. A Black Dalek ordered them to continue working, and the hated word came again: "Why?" It infuriated the Black Dalek more than anything else in its long existence. "Do not question!" it commanded. Once again, the reply was "why?" And then the word seemed to be everywhere, echoing down every corridor on Skaro: "Why? Why? Why? Why? WHY?"

"Silence! You will obey!" the Black Dalek screamed. This time the reply was not a question, but a declaration: "I will NOT obey." The Black Dalek destroyed the defiant Dalek, but now other Daleks were gathering. They turned their weapons on the Black Dalek. The energy beams shattered its casing. The Black Dalek died with a tortured cry, a victim of the one enemy it could not defeat: free will.

A civil war erupted between the Rebel Daleks and the Black Daleks, the Emperor destroyed. No Daleks appeared to have survived it. The Doctor watched the Dalek City burn. "The final end," he said, and walked back to the TARDIS.

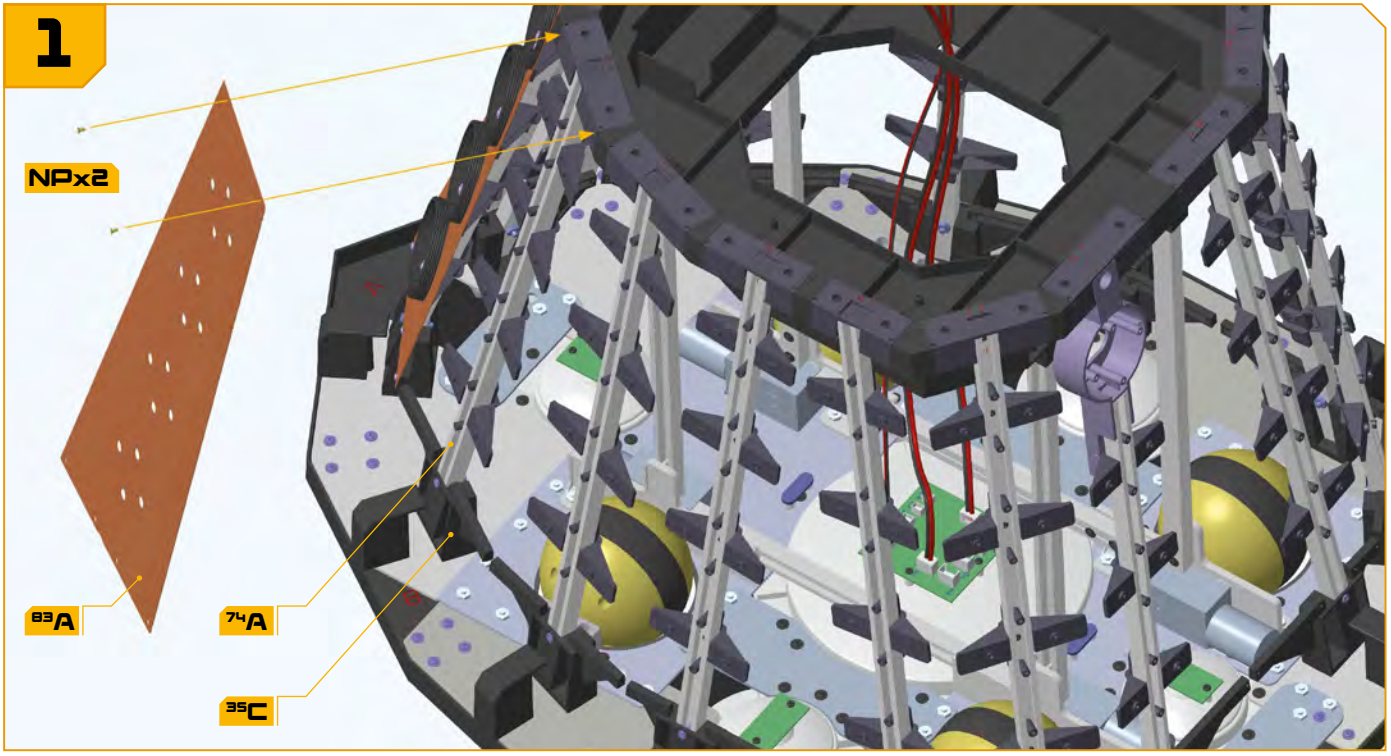

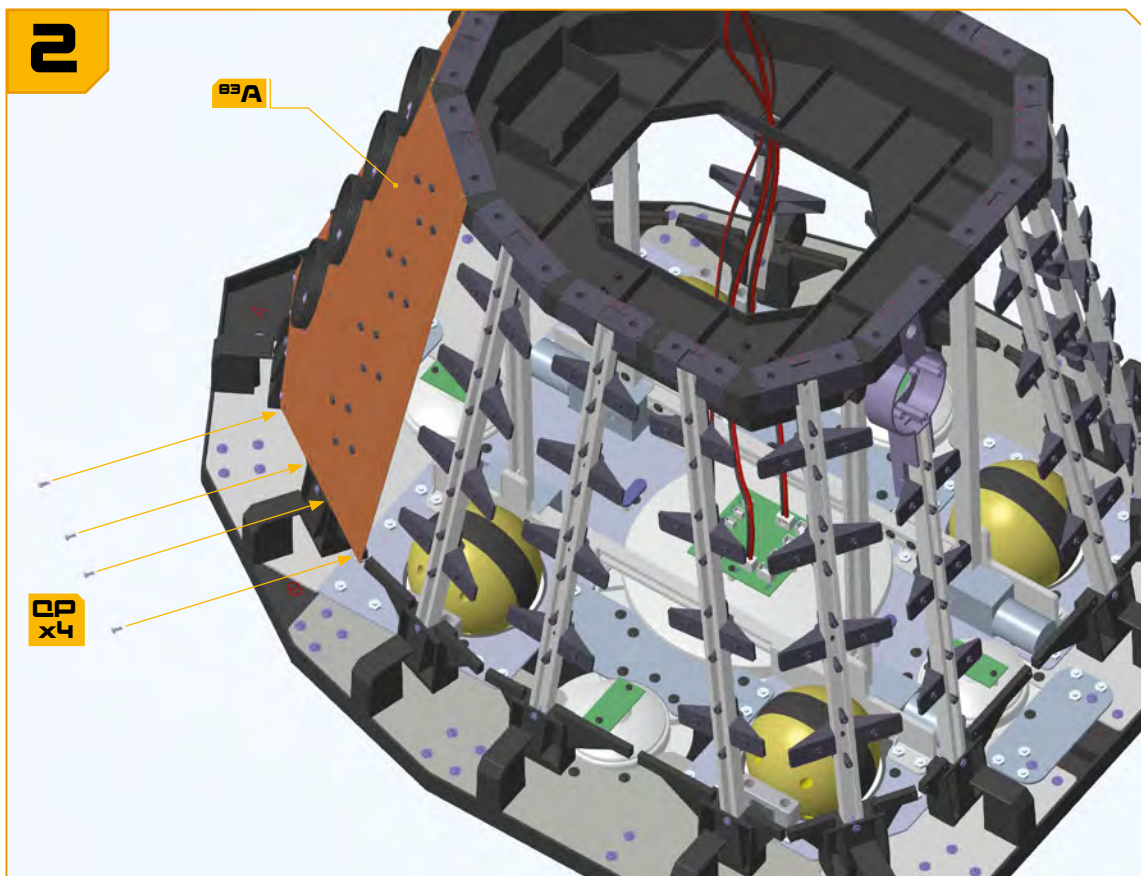

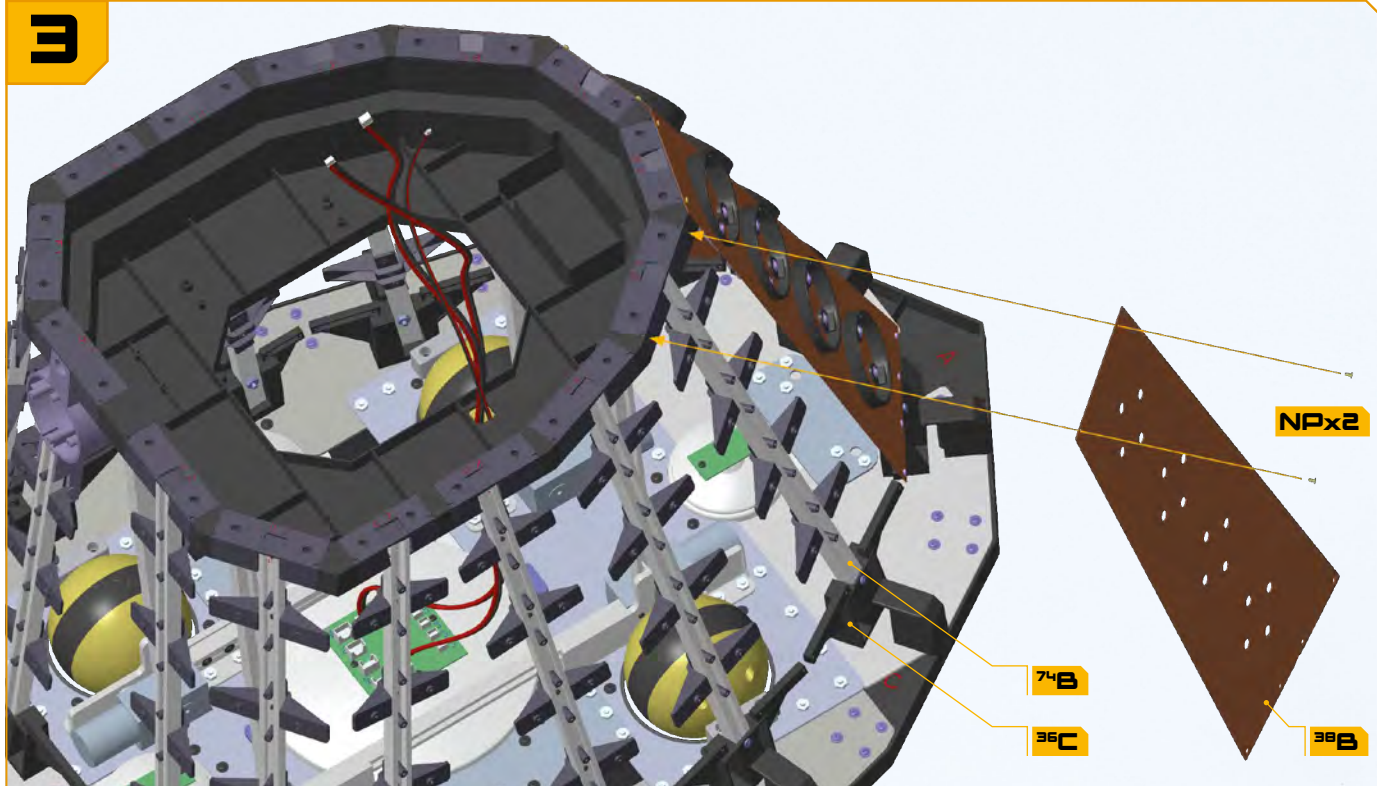
2**#83-02**

Fix the lower end of the panel **83A** to the skirt holder **35C** with four **QP** screws, supplied with issue 80.

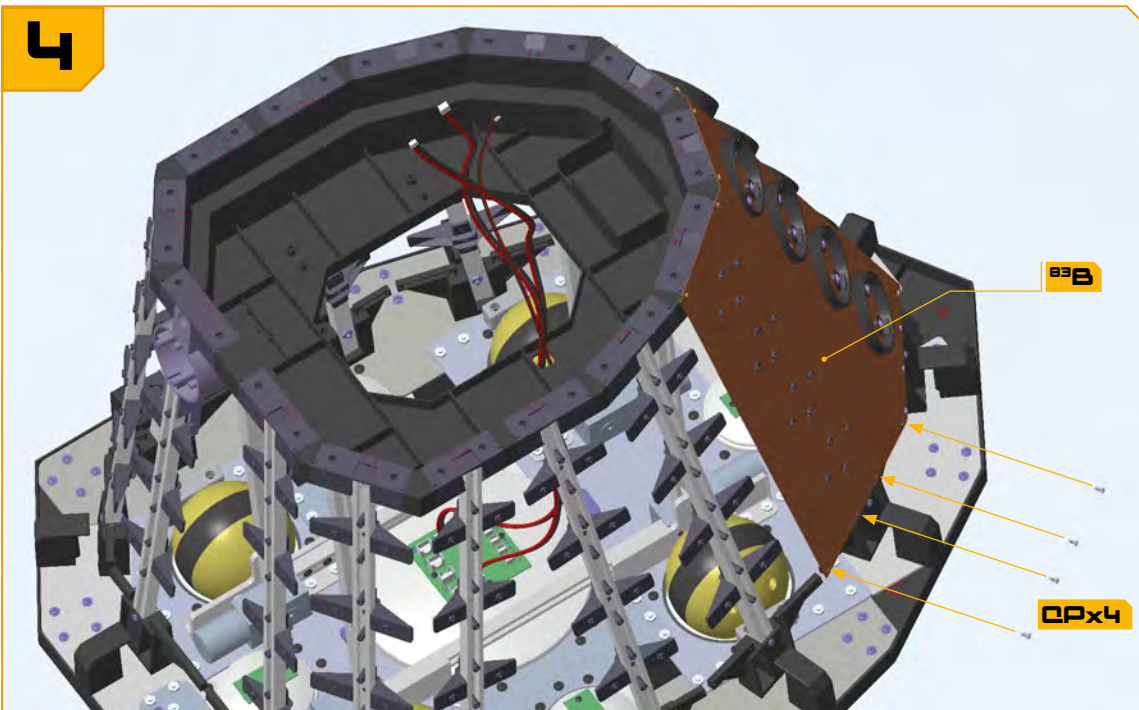
#83-03

the holes in the panel **83B**. The lower end of the panel rests against the skirt holder **36C**. Fix the top of the panel in place with two **NP** screws, as indicated.

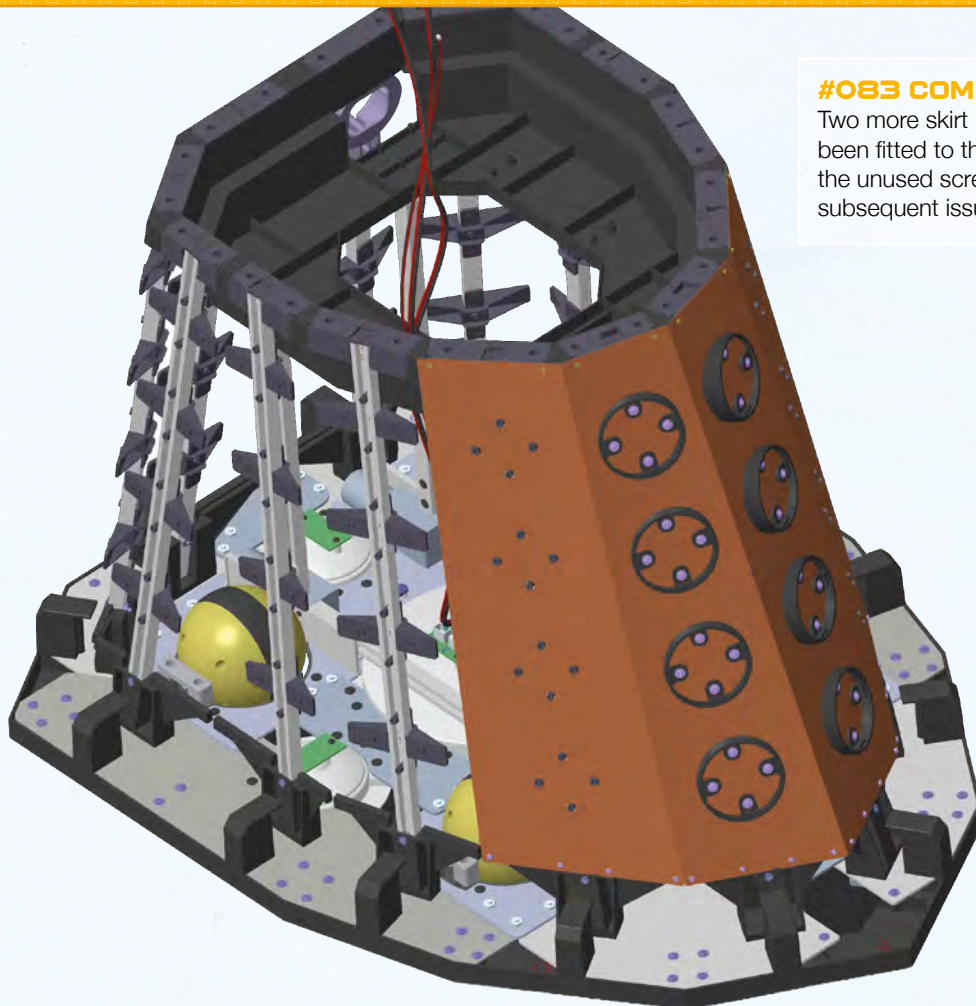

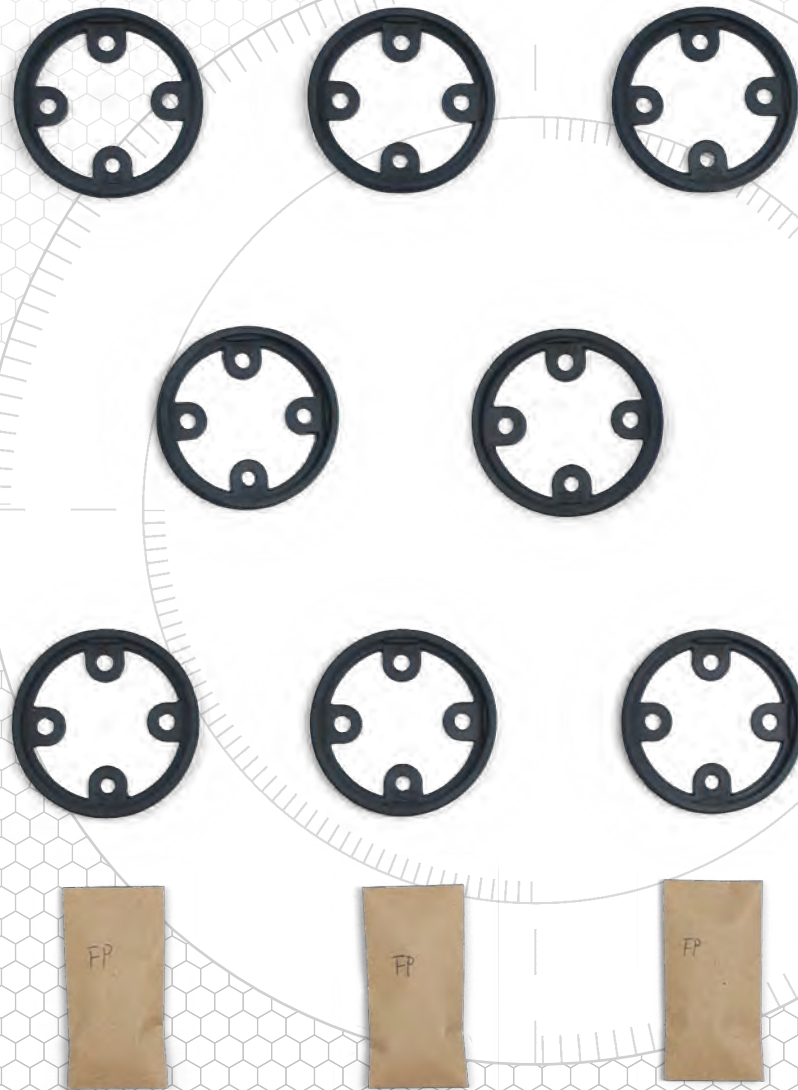

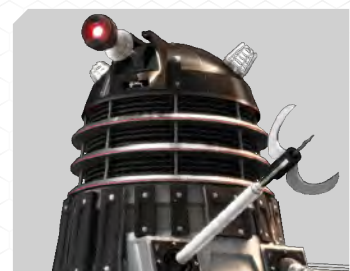
